This ed's note is dedicated to our heroes who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

On the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month, a minutes' silence is observed and dedicated to those soldiers who died fighting to protect the nation.

Our National Ceremony includes a formal wreath-laying and the observance of a minute's silence. Traditionally the eulogy for the Unknown Australian Soldier is read. Remembrance Day 2021 will be the 28th anniversary since it was first delivered by then Prime Minister the Honourable Paul Keating.

We have included a feature about The Unknown Soldier for those who may not know the story behind this.


The remains of an Unknown Australian Soldier, exhumed from a First World War military cemetery in France, was ceremonially entombed in the Australian War Memorial's Hall of Memory, the moment of burial being at 11.00 am. The significance of the date being At 11 am on 11 November 1918, the guns on the Western Front fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare, with the Germans calling for an armistice (suspension of fighting) in order to secure a peace settlement.

Then in 1997, Governor-General Sir William Deane issued a proclamation formally declaring 11 November to be Remembrance Day, urging all Australians to observe a one-minute silence at 11.00 am on 11 November each year, to remember those who died or suffered for Australia's cause in all wars and armed conflicts.


No matter where you are or what you are doing on the day, I would ask that we all take a minute of silence to honour our fallen and the sacrifices they have made for us to enjoy our way of life. Something they never had the chance to do. It is a small ask, but they should be given the respect and acknowledgment they fully deserve.

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

Special interest subjects include Development of the Modern World and Aeronauts to Astronauts.



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Bribie Rotary Update

The Rotary Club of Bribie Island's primary focus has always been our local community while supporting the many Australian and International Rotary programs.

Programs like the Rotary Foundation, the Australia Rotary Health, Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children (ROMAC) and Rotary Australia World Community Service (RAWCS) are staffed and supported by volunteers.

Rotary Club members are encouraged to nominate activities deserving of Rotary support and fundraise to support them.

Bribie Rotary recently completed two RAWCS projects.

Ethiopian Cultural Dinner

In September, the Club, with members of the new satellite club, hosted an Ethiopian Cultural dinner on behalf of the Ethiopian community. Held at Bribie Respite Centre, the dinner catered by the Ethiopian community included Ethiopian dancing, a coffee ceremony, and demonstrated traditional cultural experiences.

The \$8000 raised from the evening will pay the cost of shipping a container of donated medical equipment to Ethiopia.

Kids to the Coast

The second project, "Kids to the Coast-Bribie Island", caters for children of disadvantaged families living in droughtaffected areas which have been unable to give their children a holiday because of financial anxiety or mental trauma. RAWCS donated \$15000 towards the project subject to matching fundraising. Thanks to the Butterfly House's kind support, Bribie Bowls Club members, Toc H Coungeau House, the Woorim Life Saving Club, Melsa Park Train, and anonymous donations that provided cash or



The Melsa Park train was very popular with the kids from Goondiwindi in-kind assistance. Together with further off Bribie donations, Rotary raised \$30000 for this project.

Children from Goondiwindi were hosted for a week in October. Children visited Australia Zoo and participated in numerous activities on Bribie Island, including school visits where the children established pen pal friendships. The beaches, Butterfly House and Melsa Park Train, were popular activities, and the kids loved the food from Toc H Coungeau House.

Two more camps from Cherbourg and Proston are planned before Christmas.

W orld Polio Day on 24 October was established by Rotary International to commemorate the birth of Jonas Salk, who developed the first vaccine against poliomyelitis (polio).

Every year, Rotary International and its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) use World Polio Day to celebrate the individuals and organisations that have brought the world so close to polio eradication and to highlight the remaining challenges.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, polio frontline workers have continued to vaccinate millions of children in order to keep polio eradication on track, stop polio outbreaks and support national and community responses to other vaccine-preventable disease threats. And even despite the collapse of the Afghanistan government in August 2021, the Taliban have allowed vaccinations to continue.

On Sunday 24 October 2021, Rotary d9560 Passport Club held a very successful virtual event. We raised much-needed funds and honoured the achievements of our Polio survivors and workers – both frontline and behind the scenes – who contribute tirelessly to vaccinate, fundraise and raise awareness about Rotary's End Polio Campaign.

Guest speakers at our Quiche and Bubbles Lunch were Rotary International Zone 8 Representative, Dr Jessie Harman and Susanne Rea OAM, founder of World's Greatest Meal to End Polio. Both speakers gave excellent presentations and up to date information on the End Polio campaign.


Barry has interviewed 148 people, mostly old timers, who told amazing stories and

This song tells the story of a couple at a dance. He tells his wife that she is free to dance and socialize with other men throughout the evening, but she should not forget that she is going home with him. Inspiration for the song came from a very personal experience.

he song writing team of Doc Pomus and Mort Shuman wrote this song. In Lonely Avenue: The Unlikely Life & Times of Doc Pomus, Alex Halberstadt explains that one night, Pomus found a wedding invitation in a hatbox, and back came his most vivid memory from his wedding: watching his brother Raoul dance with his new wife while Doc, who had polio, sat in his wheelchair. Inspired, he stayed up all night writing the words to this song on the back of the invitation.

Shuman had played him a soaring Latin melody that afternoon, and he wanted the words to sound like a poem translated into English something along the lines of Pablo Neruda.

By the second verse, a hint of jealousy and vulnerability creeps in with the lyrics, "If he asks if you're all alone, can he take you home, you must tell

him no." Pomus ended his night of song writing by writing down the words that would become the title: "Save The Last Dance For Me."

Pomus and Shuman were writers for Atlantic Records, where they worked with the team of Jerry Leiber and Mike Stoller, who produced this song. Leiber and Stoller were great with Latin rhythms, which is what they used here and what Pomus had in mind with the flow of the lyrics. Leiber and Stoller were using The Coasters to record most of their songs at the time and had asked Pomus and Shuman to write songs for The Drifters.

The Drifters lead singer for this song was Ben E. King, who a few months later started scoring solo hits with "Spanish Harlem" and "Stand By Me." When they were recording the song, Atlantic Records boss Ahmet Ertegun told King how the song was inspired by Pomus watching his wife dance

with another man at his wedding, and King drew on that story to wring out the emotion in his vocals.

In a rare bonehead move by Atlantic Records honchos Ertegun and Jerry Wexler, they relegated this song to the B-side of another Pomus/Shuman composition called "Nobody But Me." It was Dick Clark who broke the song when he flipped the single and played "Save The Last Dance" on his show American Bandstand. The song gave The Drifters their only #1 hit.

It was three years after his wedding to Willi Burke that Doc Pomus wrote this song. Willi was a tall and beautiful actress - quite a contrast to the rotund Pomus. They had a daughter together, prompting Pomus to focus on songwriting, which was much more stable and lucrative than singing. Their marriage fell apart in the mid-'60s when they separated.







DONATIONS

I am pleased to advise we have been able to help several clubs and associations over the last month, as usual we continue to assist the Islands VMR, Hospice, and Global Care monthly. Once again, we will be supplying the ice-creams for the Lions Club Camp Quality Picnic this month, we hope it is an enjoyable day with great sunny weather. The BI Nashos needed some new chairs for their monthly meeting and lunch dates, BI High School P&C needed to replace their old laptop and The BI Healthy Slimmers required a new printer.

The Bribie District Little Athletics required a larger freezer too accommodate their increasing numbers of youngsters they now have 176 registered. The exhibition runs until November 14 at Bribie Island Community Arts Centre 191 Sunderland Drive Banksia Beach.
















n November 7th, 1920, in strictest secrecy, four unidentified British bodies (The soldier was assumed to have been British (though he could have been a Canadian, a New Zealander, or even an Australian) but he was intended to represent all the young men of the British Empire killed during the Great War) were exhumed from temporary battlefield cemeteries at Ypres, Arras, the Asine and the Somme.

None of the soldiers who did the digging were told why.

The bodies were taken by field ambulance to GHQ at St-Pol-Sur-Ter Noise. Once there, the bodies were draped with the union flag.

Sentries were posted and Brigadier-General Wyatt and a Colonel Gell selected one body at random. The other three were reburied.

A French Honour Guard was selected and stood by the coffin overnight of the chosen soldier.

On the morning of the 8th November, a specially designed coffin made of oak from the grounds of Hampton Court arrived and the Unknown Warrior was placed inside.

On top was placed a crusaders sword and a shield on which was inscribed:

"A British Warrior who fell in the GREAT WAR 1914-1918 for King and Country".

On the 9th of November, the Unknown Warrior was taken by horse-drawn carriage through Guards of Honour and the sound of tolling bells and bugle calls to the quayside.

There, he was saluted by Marechal Foche and loaded onto HMS Vernon bound for Dover. The coffin stood on the deck covered in wreaths, surrounded by the French Honour Guard.

Upon arrival at Dover, the Unknown Warrior was met with a nineteen gun salute - something that was normally only reserved for Field Marshals.

A special train had been arranged and he was then conveyed to Victoria Station, London. He remained there overnight, and, on the morning of the 11th of November, he was finally taken to Westminster Abbey.

The idea of the unknown warrior was thought of by a Padre called David Railton who had served on the front line during the Great War the union flag he had used as an altar cloth whilst at the front, was the one that had been draped over the coffin.

It was his intention that all of the relatives of the 517,773 combatants whose bodies had not been identified could believe that the Unknown Warrior could very well be their lost husband, father, brother or son...

When the Duke of York (later King George VI) married Lady Elizabeth Bowes Lyon in the Abbey in 1923 as she left she laid her wedding bouquet on the grave as a mark of respect (she had lost a brother during the war). All royal brides married in the Abbey since then have sent back their bouquets to be laid on the grave (as also have some royal brides who were married elsewhere).

Tomb of the Unknown Australian Soldier

Plans to honour an unknown Australian soldier were first put forward in the 1920s, but it was not until 1993 that one was at last brought home. To mark the 75th anniversary of the end of the First World War, the body of an unknown Australian soldier was recovered from Adelaide Cemetery near Villers-**Bretonneaux in France** and transported to Australia. After lying in state in King's Hall in Old Parliament House, the Unknown Australian

subtly mirror those of the dome. The slab is set into a recess of black granite, suggesting the grave within the earth. A sloping marble border sets the tomb apart from the floor, marking a physical division between the living and the resting place of sacred sacrifice.

The inscription on the tomb reads, "An unknown Australian soldier killed in the war of 1914–1918". At the head of the tomb is inscribed "Known unto God" and at the foot, "He is all of them and he is one of us."

THIS is the reason we wear poppies.

We do not glorify war.

We remember - with humility the great and the ultimate sacrifices that were made, not just in this war, but in every war and conflict where our service personnel have fought - to ensure the liberty and freedoms that we now take for granted.

Every year, on the 11th of November, we remember the Unknown Warrior. Hope you found the truth about the Unknown Warrior and the reason we wear poppies on Remembrance Day, informative and interesting.

Atthegoingdownofthesun, and in the morning, we will remember them.



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Soldier was interred in the Hall of Memory on 11 November 1993. He was buried in a Tasmanian Blackwood coffin, on which were placed a bayonet and a sprig of wattle. Soil from the Pozières battlefield in France was scattered in his tomb.

Architects Tonkin Zulaikha Harford, in collaboration with artist Janet Laurence, designed the Tomb of the Unknown Australian Soldier and the Four pillars sculpture. The tomb lies directly beneath the dome, where the souls of the dead are shown ascending to heaven. The tomb is covered with a slab of red marble inscribed with gilded lettering, colours that





King of Australian Bushrangers Episode 3

he guile of Frank Gardiner had finally gained him a Ticketof-Leave to live and remain in the district of Carcoar, effective from the first day of 1860. On the way to Carcoar, he had diverted via Boro where he recovered his considerable funds and weapons. A few days later he fronted the police station in Carcoar where he was briefed on his restrictions. When Frank asked the policeman if he knew where Fogg lived, the policeman replied, "He lives on the Abercrombie and if you go over there it will be the duty of the police to arrest you for being out of your district". Frank immediately took off for Abercrombie.

Frank was now determined that, just for starters, he would make the districts of Carcoar, Abercrombie, and Cowra his hunting grounds. He found Fogg, who introduced him to another well-organised villain, John Piesley. Frank told his plans to a receptive and enthusiastic pair. Without question they both agreed to join him and acknowledge him as their leader. Fogg and Piesley immediately set out to search for and recruit other candidates, and soon Frank had a gang of about a dozen eager young men. Before joining they had to agree to Frank's rules of discipline and behaviour.

> Among the successful candidates to the Gardiner "School of Bushranging" were men whose names would become legendary in the next decade.

They included John Piesley, William Fogg, John Gilbert, Ben Hall, John O'Meally, Dan Charters, Henry Manns, Alexander Fordyce, and Johnny Bowe. They either owned, or Frank supplied them with the best horses available, and Frank armed each of them with two of the latest handguns holstered left and right, in an attractive leather belt. The new US Navy Colt six-shooter was a single action pistol and a far superior weapon than the old Adams and Kerr double action revolvers issued to police who had only one each. The colt was far more accurate, reliable, and six rounds could be fired twice as fast as the police weapon.

In early 1860, Lambing Flats Goldfield, now Young, had just opened up. This was perfect timing for Frank as he moved into town and built a butcher's shop in the name of Frank Jones. It included living quarters on a first floor. The butcher's shop just happened to be diagonally opposite the new stagecoach depot where the gold would be loaded. While his shop was being built, Frank took his team into the bush and made them practice mercilessly in shooting and mocked up road robberies. impressing on his students the need for rehearsals and escape plans. He dressed his team immaculately in the finest clothes and leathers, emphasizing their need to look impressive, and threatening. The well drilled team could now ride faster, shoot faster and straighter, than the local police forces, and they now outnumbered them. He was also adamant that fear was the key to success and that killing, or wounding innocents would draw a huge negative response from the authorities and the public. Frank also made it clear that under no circumstances under pain of instant dismissal, would any member interfere with, harm, or terrorise a female, regardless of age.

Lambing Flats was a rich alluvial goldfield. From a small town in early 1860, it grew to a population of over 20,000 in just under a year. Thousands of aspiring diggers flowed along the road from Bathurst via Carcoar to Lambing Flats to stake their claim, while successful diggers, with their gold, flowed back, heading to Sydney via Bathurst. The small detachment of police at Lambing Flats had their hands full on "digger hunts" for mining lease payments, enforcing the no alcohol laws on goldfields and breaking up battles between Chinese and local diggers. These clashes eventually developed into

the infamous Lambing Flats riots involving thousands of diggers versus Chinese miners.

In the meantime, Frank had Fogg scouting the district, stealing cattle and sheep to be slaughtered and sold at the new butcher's shop. He had appointed a professional butcher and the business boomed. Frank Jones (aka Frank Gardiner) moved into the flat over his shop, to become a respected local businessman. In the meantime the roads in the district came under his control. He had divided his gang into three groups and assigned different sections of the roads to each group. He had briefed his teams' leaders to identify themselves at each robbery as Gardiner.

Hold-ups rapidly became endemic, all attributed to Gardiner.

The road robberies over a wide area began to number in the hundreds each week. His teams stopped and robbed returning diggers, one after the other, dozens a day, while stagecoach passengers were left stunned, suddenly stripped of all they owned, often left standing in their underwear while the bushrangers casually rode off. Frank suddenly burst into the news as the King of the Roads, a terror to every digger and stagecoach, and the boldest and greatest breaker of the law that had ever-troubled police.

As the months passed, more and more diggers began to sell their gold in Lambing Flats to newly established banks. The banks would then transport their gold to Sydney in carts under an armed escort. Frank's butcher shop began to pay dividends. He watched the depot across the road from his shop, noting the quantities being loaded, and the number of escorting guards. He recruited a young teenager who had been riding horses since he could walk to join the gang. Frank supplied him with a fast horse and paid him well to gallop at full pace with written messages to his bushranging teams. Thus his team leaders knew precisely what target, when, and by what tactic was needed, to conduct the robbery. In the following months, and into 1861, many gold shipments were intercepted



with military precision. Gardiner had hit the sweet spot in law and order as the police lacked adequate resources and reliable men. The government was in the throes of reorganising the police from its old various independent branches into one combined force under an Inspector-General's command. In the interim, the old service was alarmingly dysfunctional in imposing law on goldfields which were drawing tens of thousands into their midst.

On a typical day, in the latter part of 1860 a mail coach with a driver and an armed guard on board, was on its way between Lambing Flats and Carcoar carrying mail bags and a few boxes of gold, as well as a young couple as passengers. The driver was startled as two mounted men each with two pistols pointed at himself and the guard appeared on the road, blocking his path, yelling at him to "bail up". The guard, fumbling for his shotgun froze as a he saw a third man leading a packhorse, standing just at the edge of the bush with his pistols levelled at him. He indicated that the guard should throw his weapon to the ground. One of the other two bushrangers went to the heads of the horses while the other told the driver to start unloading his freight and strap the bags and boxes onto their packhorse. After completing the transfer the driver was told he could resume his seat, and while he was gathering up the reins, the lead bushranger tipped his hat to the lady passenger, and they rode off with their booty. As they

were leaving, one of them called out, "Hey Gardiner, I think we were successful." On reporting the robbery to police, the driver and passengers said in apparent admiration, that the robbery was carried out with a no-nonsense precision by men beautifully dressed on magnificent horses. The police, stretched to the limit, knew it was a fool's errand to try to chase the bushrangers, and simply recorded the robbery as yet another in their daily log.

On another typical day, three men on splendid bay horses were heard of as "keeping the road" between Lambing Flats and Cowra, which at that time, was alive with travellers on the road to the diggings or returning. They robbed all and sundry travellers, even bullock drivers were bailed up. On the same day, a solitary straggler, whose entire wealth consisted of 18 pence, was also stopped. The bushrangers took his money and then returned it with 10 shillings interest, saying he needed it more than they did.

One morning as Frank watched the depot, a larger than normal shipment was being loaded, then departed. He observed two troopers following the gold transport at a distance. They obviously planned to hang back, then charge in, catching the bushrangers in the act. Frank's young rider took off at a gallop with the details. About an hour into the journey the troopers saw that three riders were bailing up the cart. With great excitement they knew that their plan was working and dug in their spurs. Suddenly four riders erupted from the bush

and four abreast, each with two pistols, blocked their way, and in perfect formation advanced menacingly on the startled troopers. Discretion being the better part of valour, they wheeled about only to be blocked by two more bushrangers, sitting nonchalantly on their horses, a pistol in each hand. The downcast troopers surrendered. They were ordered off their horses and told to strip, and naked, they plodded off back towards their station. The robbers calmly completed their work and melted into the bush.

As more and more reports were made of robberies, the police were bewildered, how could Gardiner be in so many places at once?

A huge reward was offered for the capture of Frank Gardiner, with no result. He was a ghost.

Gardiner's bushranging exploits became the torment of the NSW police. Yet despite his criminal activity, Gardiner had become somewhat of a hero to the population. His reputation as a gentleman bushranger gained more and more notoriety, particularly as not one person had been harmed during his reign. Young ladies began dressing in their finest clothes and taking a coach trip from Abercrombie to Carcoar and return, in the hope of being robbed by Frank Gardiner.

During the gang's build-up in the early 1860s, Frank Gardiner met Ben Hall's married sisterin-law, Catherine (Kitty) Brown

nee Walsh, a blonde beauty then married to John Brown, a quiet, hardworking stockman. Kitty had married Brown when she was 16 years old and was at this time just 18. Frank and Ben overnighted at Kitty's home while her husband was away droving. She immediately fell head over heels for Gardiner, and throwing all caution to the wind, she spent the night in his bed. Abandoning her husband, she rode off the next day with Frank. From that day on, they were an inseparable couple. There were even tales of Kitty's participation in hold-ups of travellers disguised in men's clothing.

The gang had established a hideout deep in the Weddin Mountains (now a National Park) about 60Km west of Cowra. Each month they would all gather there to share their booty, drink merrily and plan their next moves. Several of the gang had discovered caves in the rugged hills and buried their share of the loot in their personal secret hideouts. Frank continued to send half of his share to his sisters, Archina and Charlotte. They had left the Munro household and moved to Sydney where they purchased a large home. Robina also moved in with them and the three enjoyed a comfortable middle-class lifestyle in the Sydney society.

TRAINING TIPS - RECALL

The most important behaviour you need to teach your dog is to come to you when called. This is for safety.

Never call a dog in an angry voice as he may be reluctant to approach you as you sound threatening, and also never punish him when he comes.

Never call him and proceed to do something that he doesn't like such as calling him and giving him a bath or tablet or putting him outside. It is better that you go to the dog.

Tip 1: Start early. Before you bring a dog home, come up with a feeding plan. You and your family need to sit down and decide what the rules will be. And you must all be on the same page. If mum gives food off the plate, but dad plays by the rules, it won't work. If one family member is adamant about people food, then agree to mix in some healthy options, such as low-fat vegetables, with the kibble.

Tip 2: Don't feed from the table. Doling out table scraps will cause your dog to eschew dny or canned food and hold out for more salivating options. It can also cause health problems, such as pancreatitis. In addition, variety or changes to the diet may cause diarrhoea, as well as reinforce the inappropriate behaviour of begging.

Tip 3: Keep dog food and people food separate. Never let a dog associate your food with their food. You have to keep it very separate. Otherwise they'll start to think they can eat their food and their owner's, too. Your dog should only eat food out of his bowl, and should never see food as coming from your plate or from something you're preparing for yourself.

Tip 4: Stick to a schedule. Feed your puppy two to three times each day, as recommended by your vet. Gradually increase the volume of food as you decrease

the frequency of feedings as your puppy matures. Your

adult dog should be fed once or twice daily without leaving the food out more than a short period of time. To ensure equal portions for each serving, use a measuring cup. If you do choose to incorporate healthy people

food, mix it into the kibble. Variety may be the spice of life for humans, but consistency is key for your canine.

HOWTOFOLDA FITTEDSHEET

f you're like most of us, folding your fitted sheets means wadding it into a ball, shoving it into the closet, and quickly closing the door before it comes tumbling back out.

There's a better way however—in fact, we have two.

It may take a bit of practice to really get the hang of it, but once you do you'll be thanking yourself every time you do the laundry. Lay the fitted sheet

flat, with the elastic facing up (again, inside out or outside out)


inside out or outside out are both fine). Be sure to pull the elastic edge toward the centre a bit, so that



you get a more or less rectangular shape.


Fold the entire fitted sheet in thirds lengthwise, to create a long rectangle.





Fold this rectangle in half crosswise, and then roll it (from either end) to make a compact roll that's easy to store.

Don't like the roll? After you fold the sheet in half crosswise, fold it in half again (or thirds, depending on the size). That should do it!

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

It seems like the grass really is greener on the other side!

Well, it's now November folks and the rains and storms of late have ensured that most lawns and gardens have come out of their dormancy, lush- green swards can be seen all around the district, especially with the warmer spring weather upon us contributing to the rapid surges of growth.

Things to look out for this month is weed control, the lawn weeds are prolific, flowering and setting seed faster than our grass is growing unfortunately. There are many options for weed control and just as many weed and feed type products on the market, so it's best to take stock of your lawn health and see if you have weed grasses popping up through as well.

There is still winter grass (Poa annua) in full swing producing seed and the dreaded nutgrass varieties such as (Cyperus rotundus) also becoming rampant from their persistent storage tubers joined by spreading rhizomes in the soil. These grass weeds will need a special treatment and will not be eradicated by the broadleaf weeds - (dicot) herbicides on the market. It can be daunting, messy, and dangerous to your health or the environment when mixing or applying chemicals and several applications may be needed, not to mention the difficulty trying to use them effectively when rains and squalls are about.

I am not a fan of chemical control as all those who know me can surely attest but if we must use the herbicides required to stop these weeds from growing and producing seed in the first instance, may we be able to do it in an environmentally friendly way - if possible.



Image above : Nut Grass - (Cyperus rotundus) - typically reproduces by rhizomes and egg-shaped tubers. The seed is not as viable as the Mullumbimby Couch - (Cyperus Brevifolius) which can be spread by mowing and brush cutting.

With the new technology and advancement in herbicide formulations and coupled with correct timing application, it is possible to minimise greatly any non-target damage such as surrounding plants, wildlife, and the environment. Some newer herbicides and Insecticides can come in slow release prills which upon inspection resemble slow-release fertiliser granules in appearance. These may act as a pre-emergent and stop new weeds in their tracks upon germination. As far as our diabolical nutorass is concerned (Cyperus rotundus), it has proven difficult to control and the herbicide needed to control this grass weed (sedge family) has to be systemic entirely as it needs to travel down to the egg-shaped tubers adjoined at the root system. If in doubt its surely best left to the professional contractor to assess your lawn and advise on a scheduled maintenance spray application with a tailormade recipe to bring your sward back to optimum health and bring the pest and weeds back under control. Of course there's always getting down on your hands and knees pulling weeds one by one, relaxing but time consuming. What we can do to keep our grass healthy, is by ensuring the mower blades are sharp and we can cut the grass

lower than usual while the rains are around but if we suddenly get a dry week then irrigation may be needed so no undesirable browning off occurs. When our lawns get thicker and healthier the harder it will be for some weeds to establish in the sward.

October 29 Fishing Report – Bribie Islander

The windy weather and afternoon storms have continued to upset the fishing right through October. Almost every day, the wind has picked up after lunch, with strong gusts from the NE. Storms are rolling in regularly – rainfall, so far, has totalled 147mm, which is over double the October average of 64mm. Temperatures, too, are way up – about 4 degrees above average for this month!

There's an old fisherman's tale about fish not biting when there is a northeasterly blowing - sure enough, this month when the prevailing winds on Moreton Bay have been NE catches have been less than fantastic. Betweenseasons fishing is often tricky, but this weather is not helping!

Overcoming poor conditions can be a real test of fishing skill – and accepting the challenge can lead to some satisfying results! Sarah persevered on a windy day and landed herself a 51cm flathead at Ningi Creek, using pilchards for bait.

So, where do you go when it's windy? Try anywhere that isn't windy! The Pumicestone Passage is a good area to fish when the wind is up – there is always at least one spot that you can find shelter, no matter which direction the wind is coming from. There are plenty of creeks running off the main channel, making it easy to hide during blustery weather. You'll also find rock walls, one or the other end of the bridge.

Even inside Pacific Harbour or the lock are also good places to wet a line.

Bream have been the mainstay of the recent catches with fresh baits working well and soft plastics, especially during the higher tides around the full and new moons. That's a good time to chase bream amongst the mangroves, on the mainland side of the Passage.

It also doesn't hurt to go further up the Passage and try the Donnybrook sand flats, Elimbah Creek or Bells Creek, but be careful not to be caught out by the falling tide in those creeks or you'll be there a while! Look for the deeper, highcurrent gutters, which will better your chances of a big flathead. Shane and co have been after the flathead again in the past couple of weeks, put one back that was 73cm but brought two others in!

Red Beach is another good spot to get away from the North-easterlies. Ocean beach, at Woorim, has been harder work with the strong winds, however, the deeper gutters close to the beach have been producing dart, bream and whiting some days. Sand whiting is showing up in the Passage too, especially around White Patch/Banksia Beach. As always, blood worms are the favourite, with fresh squid being a close second. Remember, sand whiting is not spotty across the top like winter whiting; it is more silvery and MUST be measured to keep (more than 23cm).

Of course, the wind has to drop sometime, and usually by evenings it settles. A bit of late-night fishing last

Darren and his crew with a couple of 40cm sandies, on the EKKA Friday holiday.

Wednesday at Bongaree Jetty scored someone a 76cm flathead, just a little TOO big to keep.

Sandcrabs don't seem bothered by the wind – there are plenty of them at the moment, although our mate, Brent, said it was "a bit of an effort rounding up the pots in the swell". The mainland side of the Passage seems to be most productive of late, but Brent warns not to put the pots too close to the sandbanks – he thinks they need a bit more depth for the bigger crabs.

Any offshore fishing has been a horribly difficult thing to plan for, with the wind and those thunderstorms. One recent charter took a group out north of Moreton Island – just a couple of mackerel, a tuskfish and one other (can't remember what) was all they had to show for a fairly uncomfortable day out!

Lastly, here are a few tips for fishing on a windy day; just in case we get a few more of them!

Don't think you always need heavy

gear when it's blowing – using lighter gear in windier conditions will often catch more fish. A biggish sinker, however, is handy, to help counter any twist the wind wants to put in your line.

Strong-smelling baits work wonders in the wind - baits such as mullet strips or mullet gut are good and oily and might change the mind of a not-so-hungry fish. They also fit well on the hook and stay there longer than other baits in the wind and rain. Softer baits like prawns or yabbies will get nibbled away before you realise if the wind is affecting the feel of your line. After casting out, try to angle your rod into the wind to reduce big loops forming and keep the line as taut as possible. Work the reel a bit and move the bait around; lift it regularly to keep it off the bottom.

Lastly, as they always say: think like a fish – would you be swimming in the shallows if the wind was chopping the water up? Or would you look for a bit of shelter yourself, using a bit of

structure like the bridge,


It looked like we were in for a wait to get through the mess. But, as the officer noticed the cream coloured beauty approaching he immediately stopped all other traffic and waved




In talking with many members of the
